




Regional Airport – Enplanements



RC General Sales Tax Collections




BBB Tax Revenue

Challenges

Demand for City services is growing:

- Rapid City population growth
- 2010-2022 Single family units added: 2,667 (as of 8-1)
 - 280 in 2021
 - 164 year to date 2022
- 2010-2022 Multi family units added: 3,593 (as of 8-1)
 - 834 in 2021
 - 443 year to date 2022
- Water production:
 - 505 million additional gallons from 2019 to 2020
 - 390 million additional gallons from 2020 to 2021
- Water taps installed
 - 2019: 269
 - 2020: 415
 - 2021: 206
 - 2022: +204 as of August 1

Challenges

- Solid Waste accts:
 - 2019: 20,375
 - 2020: 20,611 (+236)
 - 2021: 21,164 (+553)
 - 2022: 21,295 (+131 as of August 1)
- Utility bill used for solid waste disposal:
 - 2019: 7,060 tons
 - 2020: 11,442 tons
 - 2021: 13,613 tons
 - 2022: 7,542 tons as of Aug 1
- Tons of yard waste disposed of:
 - 2019: 17,694
 - 2020: 20,341
 - 2021: 19,902
 - 2022: 10,276 as of Aug 1

Challenges


- Homeless population growing quickly
- Emergency service employees are overworked and understaffed.
- Increased need for human services delivery
- Workforce is lean, bordering on scarce.
- Community/Political division
 - Difficult to build consensus





Journey On and VOA

- Journey On responded to 4,325 calls for service from January 1 to June 30:
 - Saving the RCPD \$592,525 in personnel and other resources.
- Journey On responded to numerous calls for service, provided transportation and other services:
 - Effectively averting 1,092 ambulance calls/transports
 - Saving the RCFD \$504,500 in personnel and other resources
- VOA is the case work and emergency housing component
- Total savings to taxpayers: \$1,097,029
 - Not to mention the availability of services for other citizens
