Pursuant to due call and notice thereof, a regular meeting of the City Council of the City of Rapid City was held at City Hall, Council Chambers, 300 Sixth Street, in Rapid City, South Dakota on Monday, September 18, 2023, at 6:30 P.M.

**PROCLAMATION:**

Mayor Salamun read in the Proclamation for Constitution Week.

**GENERAL PUBLIC COMMENT** (3-minute time limit per speaker)

Mia Rivera thanked Evans for voting yes for the Hope Center relocation. Annie Bachand, President of Liberty and Justice For All, spoke on homelessness and the lack of shelters. She said the council should come up with a humane solution for a new shelter and that it was a moral failure to deny the new location of the Hope Center. Riley Matheson, member of Liberty and Justice For All; told the council that September 19 is National Voter Registration Day, and encouraged the public to register. Andrea Lies presented packets to the council on potential locations where the Hope Center could be moved. She wants them to reconsider the vote. Christine Carry spoke in favor of the Hope Center. She said inflation will continue to make it difficult to find a new location. She thinks it's the council's responsibility to help find a new location; Adrian Epp said there should be more cycling paths and the city needs to add to the cycling infrastructure. Joanne Silvernagel, retired senior citizen, spoke on some seniors being evicted from Clock Tower apartments. She stated the apartment management will take forceable entry if the tenant does not move out. It is impossible to find affordable housing in 30 days. She does not think this is legal. Kylee Koller, said she is having landlord issues at Prairie Acres Trailer Park. She has not gotten a lease agreement from the new owner. They can't afford to fix all of their demands. She said they are evicting over half the park and there is nothing that is protecting the trailer park owners. She wants the city to help. Joan Koller said she received an eviction notice even though she's lived there for 40 years. She said there is a new owner almost every ten years. She has nowhere to go. Coty Terry also lives in the trailer park. Owners have asked for roof replacement, painting, and rock around the trailer. When the fire department was contacted, they said the residents weren't breaking a fire code. Everything they want done is cosmetic. They have also raised rent 70% in less than 13 months. The residents own their trailers and are getting kicked out of them because they can't afford to move the trailer to another location. The city will be dealing with a lot more homeless people if this isn't addressed.

**NON-PUBLIC HEARING ITEMS** -- Items 2 – 27

Adrien Epp spoke on item (PW091223-02) and said the city should not spend \$19 million on reconstruction of Sheridan Lake Road. He said widening of the road is just a band aid. He said the city should look at other solutions like public transportation or a light rail system. He said the widening won't fix the problem. They should use that money for an alternate solution.

Mayor Salamun read in item (PW091223-02) Authorize Staff to Advertise for Bids for Sheridan Lake Road Reconstruction Corral Drive to Catron Boulevard. Project No. 23-2737 / CIP No. 51122.2. Estimated Cost \$19,000,000.00. Motion was made by Maher, second by Biberdorf to approve. Evans spoke in opposition to the project. He said \$19 million can be better spent in other areas. Motion carried 7-2 with Evans and Pettigrew voting no.

Mayor Salamun read in item (PW091223-06) Authorize Mayor and Finance Director to Sign Agreement between the City of Rapid City and FMG Engineering, Inc., for professional services for the Utility Maintenance Professional Services Agreement for Service Line and Locates Transition to GIS, Project Number 23-2762 / CIP Number 51357. In the amount of \$425,515.00. Tech explained there are old paper records kept and they need to go into a digital data base. This is an upcoming requirement of the State. Strommen thinks this should be an inhouse job. Tech said there is no one in house with the training or time to do this job. This information is used daily for 811 service calls, service lines and water mains. Strommen said he'd like to see a different approach. Tech will be doing a formal presentation to the council at an upcoming meeting. Evans thinks this amount is excessive and that the city should not be hiring projects out. Motion was made by Seachris, second by Ham to approve. The motion carried 8-1 with Strommen voting no.

Mayor Salamun read in item (PW091223-07) Authorize Mayor and Finance Director to Sign an Agreement for Professional Services between the City of Rapid and FMG Engineering, Inc. for Water System Survey Project 1, Project No. 23-2767, CIP No. 51407 in the amount of \$231,600.00. Motion was made by Ham, second by Biberdorf to approve. Motion carried 8-1 with Strommen voting no.

Mayor Salamun read in item (PW091223-08) Authorize Mayor and Finance Director to Sign 2024-2026 Title VI Program Plan as Required by FTA To Receive Federal Transit Grant Funds. Strommen asked if this had anything to do with a new bus schedule. Tech said no, that this is part of the Civil Rights Act and is completed every three years. Strommen suggested looking at new routes. Evans said the public should have input. Motion was made by Roberts, second by Seachris to approve. Motion carried 9-0.

#### **NON-CONSENT ITEMS** – Items 23 - 27

Dustin Coleman, owner of Cole-Tac, addressed the council regarding item (PW091223-12). He said the area is lacking sidewalks and he asked council to waive this requirement. He said money could be used for establishing growth, job creation and community involvement. Adrian Epp spoke on item (LF091323-05) and said the city doesn't have a parking problem. He said there is parking within a few blocks of desired locations and people just need to walk or ride their bike. He stated a parking study gives an incomplete picture and is a waste of money.

Mayor Salamun read in item (LF083023-08) Second Reading of Ordinance No. 6589 an Ordinance to Amend Section 9.28.050 of the Rapid City Municipal Code Relating to Discharging Firearms. Having passed its first reading on September 5, 2023, motion was made by Roberts, second by Maher that the title be read the second time. Upon vote being taken, the following voted AYE: Maher, Ham, Strommen, Biberdorf, Roberts, Seachris, and Roseland; NO: Evans and Pettigrew; whereupon the Mayor declared the motion passed and Ordinance No. 6589 was declared duly passed upon its second reading.

Mayor Salamun read in item (LF083023-07) Second Reading of Ordinance No. 6588 an Ordinance to Repeal Rapid City Municipal Code Section 9.12.120 School Grounds-Prohibited Acts. Having passed its first reading on September 5, 2023, motion was made by Roberts, second by Strommen that the title be read the second time. Upon vote being taken, the following voted AYE: Maher, Ham, Strommen, Biberdorf, Roberts, Seachris, Evans, Pettigrew and Roseland; NO: None; whereupon the Mayor declared the motion passed and Ordinance No. 6588 was declared duly passed upon its second reading.

#### ***Public Works Committee Items***

Mayor Salamun read in item (PW091223-12) Request From Jim Semmler on behalf of Dustin Coleman for a variance to waive the requirement to install sidewalk along Jet Drive and Concourse Drive, per City Ordinance 12.08.060. Staff Recommendation was to deny. Motion was made by Roberts, second by Maher to approve the variance. Evans offered a compromise to grant a variance on Concourse Drive and deny a variance on Jet Drive. Pettigrew said he feels strongly about installing sidewalks. There is a school, daycare, church and county offices in that area. Having a sidewalk encourages activities like

walking and biking, while also creating safety. Roberts said waiving the sidewalks is an opportunity for the applicant to save money and create new jobs. Maher said he worked in the Rushmore Business Park for 25 years and there is not a lot of traffic during the day. It is a safe and clean area and he will support the variance. Seachris said she is not generally going to vote to waive sidewalks. Pettigrew said the sidewalk is in the best interest of the citizens. Roseland is in favor of sidewalks. Substitute motion by Strommen, second by Evans to approve the variance on Concourse Drive and deny the variance on Jet Drive. Roberts said the city is not monetarily responsible for installing incomplete sidewalks. The city can "call in" sidewalks if they want the owners to install them. Pettigrew thinks council should mandate sidewalks with no variances. The applicant reminded council that Jet Drive goes nowhere and it's very unlikely that it will be used. Motion passed 7-2 with Roberts and Maher in favor of the entire variance.

Mayor Salamun read in item (CC090523-03) Second Reading, Ordinance 6580, regarding FY2024 Appropriation Ordinance. Having passed its first reading on September 5, 2023, motion was made by Roberts, second by Strommen that the title be read the second time. Upon vote being taken, the following voted AYE: Maher, Ham, Strommen, Biberdorf, Roberts, Seachris, Evans, Pettigrew and Roseland; NO: None; whereupon the Mayor declared the motion passed and Ordinance No. 6580 was declared duly passed upon its second reading.

Mayor Salamun read in item (LF091323-05) Authorize Staff to Advertise a Request for Proposals (RFP) to Conduct a Downtown Parking Study and Strategic Plan Update. Staff recommendation was to approve. Fisher said the parking study could be postponed at this time. There are over 200 permitted spaces available right now. She doesn't feel like there is currently a deficit. She suggested reviewing this again in two years and bring it back to council at that time. She wants to make sure the city gets the locations right. Motion was made by Strommen, second by Roberts and carried 9-0 to table the item.

Evans suggested that the owner provide each individual using the facility a gun safety class and require a video on gun storage before the public is allowed to use the facility. It was stated that this type of activity is heavily regulated by the EPA. Fisher said this ordinance doesn't just pertain to one applicant, it pertains to this specific

address. She indicated the ordinance was written with careful thought and advice from other cities. Upon vote being taken, the following voted AYE: Biberdorf, Ham, Strommen, Maher, Roberts, Seachris, and Roseland; NO: Evans and Pettigrew; whereupon the Mayor declared the motion passed 7-2 and Ordinance No. 6586 was declared duly passed upon its second reading
